


NEW BOOKS IN THE LIBRARY

Historical Fiction



Science Fiction



Dark Life by Kat Falls


Science Fiction

Contemporary/Realistic Fiction



Fantasy Fiction






A Map of Days by Ransom Riggs

Meningococcal Disease

due to A, C, W and Y strains

The National Immunisation Program provides a free meningococcal ACWY vaccine for students in Year 10. The local council in your school area co-ordinates the school-based immunisation program.

What is meningococcal disease?

Meningococcal disease is a rare but severe infection caused by bacteria called *Neisseria meningitidis*. It has the potential to cause lifelong disability or death, and can affect people at any age.

Meningococcal bacteria are carried in the nose and throat of some healthy people. These carriers do not typically become sick but can spread the bacteria through secretions in the throat and nose. This is more likely to occur through close prolonged contact. The bacteria are more commonly carried by teenagers and young adults.

What is the vaccine being offered?

The vaccine provides protection against the meningococcal A, C, W, and Y strains. Only a single immunisation is required.

This vaccine does not protect against the B strain. There is a separate vaccine for the B strain which is available through private prescription.

What can I do if I think my child has had the meningococcal ACWY vaccine?

The Tasmanian Government offered free MenACWY vaccines to 15 to 19 year olds from August 2017 to April 2018, and to 6 week olds to 21 year olds from 26 July 2018. Your child may have had the vaccine through these programs.

If you are unsure if they have had the ACWY vaccine, please call the Australian Immunisation Registry on 1800 653 809 or check at <https://my.gov.au>

If they have had the ACWY vaccine, your child does not need another dose. Please complete the consent form, sign the "NO" section and list the reason.

If they have not had the vaccine, they can receive it now through school. Complete the consent form and sign the "YES" section.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Immunisation

Immunisation is the safest and most effective way to stop the spread of many infectious diseases. Immunisation protects the individual from harmful disease, and also offers important benefits for the long-term health of the community by reducing the spread of disease. The protection provided by some childhood vaccines weakens over time and needs to be boosted in adolescence e.g. whooping cough. For other diseases, early adolescence is the best time for the vaccine to be given e.g. human papillomavirus vaccine.

Are the vaccines safe?

All vaccines in Australia are tested for safety and effectiveness before they are approved for use. This testing is required by law. Australia also has a national surveillance system, which reports and monitors all adverse events following immunisation.

Who needs to sign the consent form?

The consent form MUST be signed by a parent or legal guardian. Where parents have shared custody of their child/ren, the expectation is that they will discuss the healthcare of their children and come to a mutual decision regarding immunisation.

What if I don't want my child immunised through the school program?

If you do not want your child immunised at their school, please sign the "NO" section on the consent form, and return the consent form to the school by the due date.

Can I withdraw consent?

Consent may be withdrawn at any stage prior to immunisation by contacting the local council who is responsible for coordinating the immunisation day in your school (see over).

What happens if my child misses the dose at the school session?

If your child misses the immunisation at school, they can go to their general practitioner for the vaccine. If your child is immunised by your doctor, the vaccine will be free but you may be charged a consultation fee. Some councils offer free catch-up immunisation clinics.

What should my child do on the day of immunisation?

On the day of immunisation, your child should eat breakfast. It is helpful to wear sports uniform or clothing that can be pulled up for the injection to be given easily into the upper arm.

Will a record of the immunisation be provided?

Yes. Your child will be given a record of immunisation. The immunisation will also be recorded on the Australian Immunisation Register (AIR).

Should the vaccine be given to a female who is or thinks she may be pregnant?

No. Any female who is, or thinks she may be pregnant will not be immunised at school. On the day of the clinic the immunisation provider will ask female students if they are or could be pregnant. If a student answers yes to this question, she will not be immunised and the student will be urged to discuss the issue with her parent/guardian and to seek medical advice.

What if a reaction occurs after immunisation?

Side effects can occur but are mostly mild and don't last long. The most common side effects include headache, fever and reactions at the injection site, such as pain, redness or swelling.

Serious side effects are very rare.

1. If there is tenderness at the injection site, an ice pack may help to relieve the pain.
2. Only give paracetamol (as per directions) if pain and fever are present.
3. If an unexpected reaction occurs that you are concerned about please contact your local doctor or seek medical attention.
